NPA junior Eva Madsen led the Spartans with a sixth-place result at 20:34.89, while Coconino junior Savanna McKerracher paced the Panthers with a 21:12.54 time that was good enough for eighth overall.

McKenna Marino was NPA's highest-placed senior in the girls race, finishing 15th with a time of 21:41.15.

"I was really happy to race today," Marino said. "It's sad that this is my last year. It was really fun to race today."

The boys race looked to be a lot closer as the lead runners crossed over into the last leg of the race in a dead heat.

Bland led an Eagles three-headed monster with sophomore Uuts Masayumptewa and junior Ezra Varley. Junior runner Yohanes van Meertan, who won the city meet as a freshman with NPA in 2023, did not run the race on Wednesday.

"We wanted to do something where we kind of start out conservative so we can run with a big pack of the team at first, and then kind of free-forall it in that last mile," Bland said. "We were laughing and joking with some of the Coco kids, too. It was fun and games for a little while."

As Bland was coming to the finish line, the arch that marked the end of the race began to deflate. Nearby coaches and officials rushed to keep the arch high enough for Bland to get across the line without trouble.

He put his arms up in disbelief as he came to the line but acknowledged how beautiful the moment was.

"I think that was really symbolic," Bland said. "All the coaches jumped in there and saved it. It was great."

Flagstaff took the top seven spots in the boys race. Bland and Masayumptewa (16:02.90) maintained their 1-2 running order, but junior Jacob Medina pulled away in the final seconds to take the final spot on the podium with a time of 16:17.72. Varley finished fourth just behind at 16:21.70.

Sophomore Kenyan Lee (16:47.16), senior Elijah Talkalai (16:52.88) and senior Cedric Johnson (16:53.93) rounded out the top-seven sweep for the Eagles.

Coconino sophomore Mile Seumptewa led the Panthers with an eighth-place result at 16:58.52. BASIS Flagstaff junior Miguel Rodriguez-Rosero got close to besting Coconino's top finisher, but crossed the finish

line two seconds behind in ninth. NPA senior Emilio Haubert continued the trend of a two-second stagger between top team finishers with a 17:02.04 time for 10th.

Daron Coochyamptewa led Coconino's three-deep senior class with a 28th-place result and a time of 19:56.24. He said the chance to lead his classmates in his final home meet was a memorable moment.

"It means a lot just because I've run up here the past four years," Coochyamptewa said. "Just being

around friends and family that came from all over just to watch, it means a lot."

This year's meet was a good measuring stick for each local team as the cross country season begins its final stride. Coconino will return to action the soonest at the Bradshaw Mountain Invitational on Saturday. Flagstaff and NPA will compete in Boulder Creek's second home meet on Wednesday. BASIS Flagstaff will next appear at the East Valley Invite at Frontier Family Park in Queen Creek on Oct. 22.
